Fall is upon us and with the change of season comes so much growth at All God's Children Preschool. We are in our second month of school and the staff and students are settling into daily routines. The



Living Lord Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes October 22, 2025

Attendees: Pastor Ed, Beverly Brockschmidt, Rae Dowling, Mary Hunter, Rich Jones, Patty Kunkel, Stephney Rose, Scott Smith, Karen Symos. Absent: Rhoda Olson. Call committee member Pauline Priest.

Opening Prayer & Devotions: Pastor reminded the council that God has a plan for us. We have a future with hope and this should bring us joy.

Minutes Approval: A motion [was made](#) by Patty and seconded by Karen to approve the minutes from the September 17th, 2025, meeting. The motion passed unanimously.

Financial Report – The full financial report is available in the office.

Church General Fund receipts through September are \$20,300 more than last year and \$4300 about budget.

Church General Fund Disbursements are \$13,500 below budget.

All God's Children is \$15,580 favorable to disbursements through August 2025.

Karen presented to Council two requests to approve moving monies. The first request is to move \$4406.28 from inactive restricted accounts to the restricted account 3716 – Pastoral Call reserve. This action is requested due to inactivity of these accounts for more than 3 years.

1) Inactive Restricted Accounts: 3760-1 - \$785.39 - Non budgeted Receipts and Disbursements

3702-8 - \$320.89 - Mah Jong Club 3800 - \$3300.00 - Various small Memorials Total = \$4406.28

These monies would be moved to the restricted account 3716 - Pastoral Call Reserve. A motion was made by Rae and seconded by Rich and unanimously approved to complete the action.

The second request was to donate monies (\$724.60) from the Outreach account to a specific external non-profit. After discussion a motion was made by Rae, seconded by Rich and approved unanimously to split the donation and move \$350 to Hope Family Services and the remaining \$374.60 moved to Evangelism for use internally in the Church. 2) Account 3771 - Outreach. \$724.60 should be disbursed as follows: \$350 donated to Hope Family Services \$374.60 should be moved into the Evangelism account 4141.

Also, Karen advised us that anyone that is a Thrivent member can apply twice a year for a \$250 grant that can be used by the church for various items. If you are a Thrivent member, see Karen for more details.

Pastor's Report – Pastor provided his written report and advised the council that Bill and Ruth McConnell along with Pastor would be attending the Gulf Coast Synod conference on October 25, 2025.

Team Reports – All team reports were submitted electronically and are available in the office.

Worship & Music – Jazz Concert is November 15, 2025..

Stewardship – A Town Hall meeting is scheduled for Oct 26th @ 10am – a light breakfast will be served. Also, a Meet & Greet to introduce our ministries and ways to take part will be held on Sunday November 2nd. Time and talent surveys were sent out and have been requested to be returned by November 16th.

Campus Improvement – The men's room is now complete. A full update of the Campus improvements that have been completed this year will be given at the Town Hall meeting on October 26th.

Education – A Trunk or Treat event for kids will be held on October 25th from 3-5pm.

Widow's Group – Beverly coordinates this group, and they currently have 9 members. The members are appreciative of this ministry, and the group is doing well.

All God's Children – AGC staff will be attending a Preschool conference in Orlando October 16th – 18th, 2025. The website is being updated. A request was made to allow AGC staff to install a new shed in the existing playground area for the storage of toys and other playground equipment. Motion was made by Patty, seconded by Rae, and approved unanimously to allow the new shed.

Old Business: The executive team is working to find people to serve on Council next year.

Next meeting: November 19, 2025, 4pm at Living Lord Lutheran.

The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.

What is the Deeper Meaning of Christmas? From the Faith Community Nurses

In the midst of all upheaval, crisis, difficulty, problems, and fear comes the true message of Christmas with all of its hope, goodwill, and cheer. The message of Christmas has been terribly misapplied and misunderstood for many years. Some think of business profits, shopping, gifts, tinsel, toys, and celebration. Others think only of Bethlehem, of the star in the sky, shepherds in the field, and angels singing. Still others cynically ask, "Where is this Prince of Peace in a world filled with so much trouble?"

The real Christmas message goes far deeper. It heralds the entrance of God into human history. It is Heaven descending to Earth. It is as though a trumpeter had taken his stand upon the turrets of time and announced to a despairing, hopeless, and frustrated world the coming of the Prince of Peace. It answers all the great questions that plague the human race at this hour. The Christmas message is relevant, revolutionary, and reassuring to us today. I believe it can be summed up in three words: a cradle, a cross, and a crown.

On that first Christmas night, the Bible tells us about the angel coming to those fearful shepherds and saying, "Fear not, I bring you good news" (Luke 2). This is the true meaning of Christmas—the Good News—that God sent His only Son to Earth to save people from their sins. Christmas is not a myth, not a tradition, not a dream—it is a glorious reality.

Ask The Weatherman

How dry am I? High pressure has been the main weather feature in Florida during most of the Fall (Sep, Oct, Nov) 2025 along with the absence of tropical storm activity. The result is the development of extensive drought. As of 26 Nov, Extreme Drought (D3) and Exceptional Drought (D4) cover most of North Florida with Severe Drought (D2) in most counties along the west coast of the Florida peninsula. The Fall rainfall in Tampa is only 0.88 inches, 9% of normal. Fall rainfall in Tallahassee is 1.59 inches, 15% of normal. Fall rainfall in Parrish is 2.53 inches, 20% of normal, and the driest Fall since we moved here from CA in 2005. Second driest Fall in Parrish was 5.55 inches in 2023. Fall rainfall in our airport (SRQ) is 3.04 inches, 30% of normal. Barring no rain the last few days of Nov, it is the driest fall at SRQ since records began in 1911.

Was it a hot October globally? October 2025 was the third-warmest October on record for the globe. The global surface temperature for Oct 2025 was 2.21 degrees F higher than the 20th century baseline, ranking as the third-warmest October since global records began in 1850. Only two Octobers were warmer (2023 and 2024). All 10 of the warmest Octobers on record have occurred since 2015. Looking at the year-to-date, the Jan-Oct global surface temp was the second highest on record, trailing behind the same period in 2024. Several regions experienced their warmest Oct on record, including North America, the Arctic region, and the Antarctic region.

Are there more Melissa records? Shortly before 28 Oct landfall, Melissa's gusts hit 252 mph, surpassing the 249 mph peak gust recorded by Typhoon Megi in 2010. The Melissa record was set at 700 feet altitude by a NOAA Hurricane Hunter deploying a dropsonde (parachuted weather instrument package). Max sustained surface wind was 215 mph during Typhoon Nancy on 12 Sep 1961 and Hurricane Patricia on 23 Oct 2015. Max wind gust ever recorded in our hemisphere was 231 mph at Mt Washington NH on 12 Apr 1934. Highest recorded tornadic wind speed was 302 mph at the Bridge Creek OK tornado in May 1999. Land speed record of 763.035 mph was set in 1997 by ThrustSSC, a turbofan jet-powered car driven by Andy Green..

Are we losing our glaciers? Glaciers around the globe are disappearing faster than ever, with the last 3-year period seeing the largest glacial mass loss on record. The 9,000 gigatons of ice lost from glaciers since 1975 are roughly equivalent to an ice block the size of Germany with the thickness of 25 meters. Five of the last six years had the largest losses, with glaciers losing 450 gigatons of mass in 2024 alone. Between 2000 and 2023, melting mountain glaciers have caused 18 millimeters of global sea level rise, about 1 millimeter per year. Every millimeter can expose up to 300,000 people to annual flooding, according to the World Glacier Monitoring Service.

How much snow fell on the Corn Belt 29-30 Nov? Snow total in inches from high to low: Fort Dodge IA 16.5, Cedar Falls IA 14.5, Waterloo IA 14.5, Lancaster WI 13, Dubuque IA 12.3, Platteville WI 12, Freeport IL 12, Des Moines IA 10.5, Davenport IA 10.1, Madison WI 9.3, Moline IL 9.2, Aberdeen SD 8.6, Fort Wayne IN 8.5, Chicago IL 8.4, Rockford IL 8, Rochester MN 7.9, Janesville WI 7.8, Milwaukee WI 6.1, Duluth MN 5.8, and Huron SD 5.2.

How much snow fell in the Upper Midwest 26-27 Nov? Hurley WI 29.7, Gile WI 29, Ironwood MI 27, Marquette MI 24.2, Duluth MN 10.6, Aberdeen SD 5.2, and Bismarck ND 4.7.
