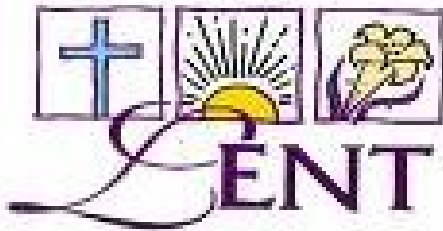

History of Canned Food Month

In the dark cold of February, when few fruits and vegetables grow, we're so grateful for Canned Food Month. Before canning, the four main ways of food preservation were salting, drying, sugaring, and smoking – but Napoleon wanted to develop a better way. In response to a contest laid out by the French government in 1809, French inventor Nicholas Appert developed the first process that involved hermetically sealing and heat-sterilizing food storage containers. Rudimentary canning was born.

Appert wrote a book on his invention that inspired many and set the canning ball rolling. Soon thereafter, an English businessman adopted the invention idea and began to create a business based on tin-canned foods (as opposed to the glass cans that Appert used). The businessman was named Peter Durand, and in 1810 he patented the use of tin cans. By 1820, his crafty food-storage creation fed the Royal Navy in massive proportions.

Canneries began to experiment with specific different materials and methods for packaging their food. The cans were originally composed of tin-plated iron, but over time they were shifted to be steel with tinplate, and eventually aluminum. Aluminum is lighter and does not rust, and it's commonly used today to package sodas and other beverages.

The 19th century saw a canning boom. Companies like Campbell Soup, Heinz, and Borden were selling off cans of food at lightning speed after the end of the economic depression in 1873. In 1903, Alexander Kerr invented the wide-mouth canning jar, for which he would later patent the famous lid – a metal disc and gasket held in place with a ring. Another name in the 19th-century canning industry was the Ball brothers, led by William Charles Ball. The brothers brought up many smaller canneries and led the industry after duplicating Kerr's invention.

Today, canned foods are still incredibly popular and the technology that surrounds them is still being developed. Commercially canned goods are used by nearly all populations, and by all types of people – from private citizens to militaries to food banks. They're a beloved (and cheap) dietary staple for many of us, and deserve all the hype they'll receive this month!

So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God. (1 Cor. 10:31)

Approval of the minutes: The minutes from the November 2023 meeting were approved unanimously.

Team Reports: All reports were submitted electronically. The following are additional notations.

Evangelism: Pastor Ed will be starting a daily blog on Facebook, but will need some help in building it out. Once it goes live, he’d like everyone to share it on their Facebook page as well. There will likely be an approximate \$5/mo cost to this endeavour.

Parish Life: Thank you to the Copelands and their team of volunteers who decorated the church for Christmas. The Parish Life team will ensure the decorations are removed by Jan. 6, 2024.

Music and Worship: Lessons and Carols will be Sunday Dec 17th at 4pm. The Spring Jazz Concert will be March 2nd at 4pm.

All God’s Children: Erin Bonifate, Director and Heather Amato, Assistant Director, provided an extensive description of what AGC is, how they operate and would like to begin an education process for the congregation. They will provide a proposal to the Council on how that education will roll out, but in the mean time they encourage everyone to read the AGC report in the monthly Voice and they will be providing information for inclusion for the weekly announcements in the bulletin and the screen. The proposal for a statue to be placed in the island, in front of AGC will be forwarded to the Council members for review, discussion and approval.

Financial Report: The detailed financials have been submitted electronically. Current offerings are down, expenses are favorable to budget and overall we are in a neutral position. The 2024 budget was presented from Financial Team. Hard copies are available in the Church office. The team presented a balance budget of \$391,955.00 for 2024. A motion was made by Rhoda and seconded by Patty to accept the budget as proposed. The motion passed unanimously. The budget will be officially discussed voted on by the Congregation at the Annual Meeting on January 28, 2024.

Call Process: The executive team is working on plans for a Congregational Retreat on February 10th from 9am-2pm at Peridia Clubhouse. Goals for the retreat include looking at our past, learning from it and determining how we want to move forward into the future. We are looking for volunteers for the Call Committee. If you are interested in serving this very important position, please let Pastor Ed or any of the Council members know. Sign up sheets will be in the narthex for the retreat. Please sign up so that we can plan for food and materials. Rebecca will be providing an update on the Transition to the congregation on Sunday December 17th. Transition Checklist – All is on track and we continue to move through the process.

Youth and Family Ministry: For the time being we will hold on hiring for a leader for the Youth Ministry.

New Business: The Building Improvement Fund is alive and well and donations are being accepted for additional work that is needed to the existing building. If you are interesting in serving on Building Improvement Committee, please reach out to Rich Jones.

Our Annual Meeting is scheduled for January 28th, 2024, 12:30pm. Please put it on your calendar.

Team Reports: All reports were submitted electronically. The following are additional notations.

Pastor's: Pastor and Maggie have been working on Mission IN-Site on the Synod website and will have some great information for the transition process very soon. We will have Pastor Sweet as our facilitator for the Retreat on Feb 10th. Fee is \$300 plus mileage. Conversation will be flexible and go where the congregation leads as appropriate.

Music and Worship: The Spring Jazz Concert will be March 2nd at 4pm.

All God's Children:

- A big thank you for those who attended the Children's Christmas Program and for the Staff Christmas gifts.
- Spring Carnival will be March. This will be a fundraiser with games, food, animals, etc.
- Summer Camp will be 6 weeks in the summer for 3-6 year olds.
- School is closed Jan 15th and Feb 19th for federal holidays.

Financial Report:

Karen Symos has agreed to take on the Bookkeeper position. She has started the transition with Lynn Fisher.

The detailed financials have been submitted electronically. Current Offerings are down, expenses are favorable to budget and overall we are in a neutral position.

2023 was the 4th year in a row that the general offering was less than the year before. This is the consequence of a decline in membership and fewer giving units. In 2023 our insurance costs and property maintenance and supplies were 47% over budget - \$16,700.00. Our investment income for the year, and savings in pastoral contract and church staff wages in the 4th qtr kept us close to budget.

Call Process:

The executive team is working on plans for a Congregational Retreat on February 10th from 9am-2pm at Perida Clubhouse. Goals for the retreat include looking at our past, learning from it and determining how we want to move forward into the future.

Sign up sheets are in the narthex for the Retreat. Please sign up.

Transition Checklist – All is on track and we continue to move through the process. Council has completed the items that they are responsible for. The Annual meeting will allow the congregation to vote on the model constitution updates and also the budget. When they are approved we will officially move to step 3 of the checklist.

To date 8 people have expressed interest in being a member of the call committee. We need 6 members to be on the committee and we will convene that team after the retreat.

Annual Meeting: The meeting will be after the 11am service on January 28. We will provide a look back at 2023, our accomplishments, vote on council members, the budget and model constitution and lay out our plans for 2024.

New Business:

- A council retreat will be scheduled after the Congregational Retreat.
- The Building Improvement Fund is alive and well and donations are being accepted for additional work that is needed to the existing building. If you are interesting in serving on Building Improvement Committee, please reach out to Rich Jones.
- AGC Statue approval. The All God's Children board has requested permission to install a cast bronze garden statue bench in the island outside of AGC entrance.

Terms include:

- ACG will purchase the bench
- the island must have ground cover that is coordinated with and acceptable to the Property Committee
- if mulch is selected, the church will be responsible for maintenance of the mulch ground cover after the initial installation.

The council approved the statue plan for AGC unanimously.

AGC provides a maintenance payment to the church monthly, however there is no written agreement for what that payment is to be used for. President Powers will work with AGC to put together a division of responsibilities.

Ask The Weatherman

Was 2023 a warm year? In Florida, it was the warmest year on record at Fort Myers, Lakeland, Plant City, Tampa, and Venice. It was the third warmest year at the Sarasota-Bradenton Airport with an average temperature of 76.1 degrees, 2.0 degrees above normal, with records dating from 1911. The year 2023 was the earth's warmest year since global records began in 1850 at 1.18C (2.12F) above the 20th century average of 13.9C (57.0F). The 10 warmest years in the 174-year record of world temperatures have all occurred during the last decade (2014-2023).

Was December 2023 a warm month? The December global surface temp was 1.43C (2.57F) above the 20th-century average of 12.2C (54.0F), making it the warmest December on record. The contiguous U.S. average temperature during December was the warmest in the 129-year record at 40.0F, 7.3 degrees F above average. The average Dec temperature at the Sarasota-Bradenton Airport was the 19th warmest on record at 66.4 degrees, 1.4 degrees above normal.

Was 2023 a dry year? It was the driest year on record at the Sarasota-Bradenton Airport with only 27.13 inches, 55 % of normal, deficit of 21.92 inches. It was the driest year in Parrish since we moved here in 2005 with 38.16 inches, 70% of normal, deficit of 16.27 inches. Naples also had their driest year on record with 30.48 inches, 62% of normal, deficit of 19.04 inches. Contrast that to Fort Lauderdale, 109 miles east on Alligator Alley, which had their wettest year on record with 113.61 inches, 187% of normal, surplus of 52.73 inches. They also set a daily rainfall record with 22.50 inches on 12 April and a new April rainfall record of 31.22 inches. Too much westerly flow from El Nino set up a pattern of dry west and wet east in Florida in 2023.

Has our drought eased? The U.S. Drought Monitor of 23 Jan showed Moderate Drought (D1) on the coast and Abnormally Dry (D0) inland of Manatee and Sarasota Counties. Improvement came from above normal rainfall in Dec and Jan with 3.62 inches at the airport in Dec and 4.30 inches so far in Jan. Parrish rainfall in Dec was 3.23 inches and 3.56 inches so far in Jan. Is Panama in drought? A severe drought that began last year has forced authorities to slash ship crossings by 36% on the Panama Canal, one of the world's most important trade routes. Reduced water levels prompted authorities to cut daily ship crossings from 38 to 24. One of the most severe droughts ever to hit Panama has stirred chaos in the 50-mile maritime route, causing a traffic jam of vessels, and casting doubts on the canal's reliability for international shipping.

How are things in California? El Nino influence has kept the heaviest precipitation in Southern California. Snowpack levels across the Sierra Nevada are 48% of normal on 27 Jan. While on 22 Jan, San Diego International Airport had 2.73 inches of rain, its 4th wettest day in 175 years and its wettest January day. Flash flooding submerged streets, stalling cars and halting trolleys.

How cold was the arctic outbreak? A deepening low pressure area moving northeast from the Panhandle dropped an arctic front southward with blizzard conditions in western KS and NE on 8 Jan and heavy snow from CO to the Great Lakes. Arctic high pressure built south with below zero temps everywhere in MT on 13 Jan and 8 stations minus 40 degrees or lower. On 14 Jan, below zero temps covered all of MT, ND, SD, NE, KS, IA, MN, and WI. On 16 Jan, every station in TX had below freezing temps. Low temps dropped to 20 at Pensacola FL on 17 Jan. Nashville TN had a record 6.3 inches of snow on 15 Jan and a low of minus 1 degree on 17 Jan. Return of moist air from the Gulf brought heavy rain and river flooding to the South 22-26 Jan.
