FAITH COMMUNITY NURSES

For nearly four decades now, the country has recognized October as National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. It is a time annually devoted to educating everyone about breast cancer – including metastatic breast cancer (MBC) – and the importance of early detection and access to timely, high-quality care.

No matter who you are or where you live, breast cancer may touch your life. It's necessary to understand the warning signs of breast cancer, your risk of breast cancer, and what's normal for you so you can take action if there are any changes in your breasts or underarm areas.

Since 1989, Susan G. Komen has helped drive down the mortality rates from breast cancer thanks to our focus on early detections and improvements in treatment. However, that progress may be in jeopardy. During the COVID-19 pandemic, many people delayed their regular breast cancer screening. The pandemic also disrupted treatment and research progress.

More progress is still needed. Through research and growing knowledge about breast cancer has led to new therapies and targeted treatments that improved outcomes for many people. It is research that brings hope to people facing this disease. We need to ensure more treatment options are available for all people facing breast cancer.

The COVID-19 pandemic also highlighted the inequities in breast cancer treatments for under-resourced communities across the country, as well as the inequity in treatment between Black and white women. Black women in the U.S. are about 40% more likely to die from breast cancer than white women.

Know Your Risk Knowing your family history is lifesaving. Talk to a doctor about your family history and see how that history impacts your risk of breast cancer. You and your doctor can create a personalized plan to monitor for signs of the disease.

Get Screened For those at average risk, have a mammogram every year starting at age 40. If you have any signs of breast cancer, finding it early and treating it early may save your life.

Know Your Normal It's important to know what's normal for you so you can talk with your health care provider if something doesn't look or feel right.

Make Healthy Lifestyle Choices Living a healthy lifestyle is within your control and may lower your risk of breast cancer. Maintain a healthy weight, limit alcohol intake and exercise regularly. It all matters when it comes to your overall health and risk of disease.

How can you tell the difference between a cyst and breast cancer? A cyst will have smooth walls and be filled with clear fluid, whereas a tumor will look solid. A small, simple breast cyst typically doesn't need treatment and should go away on its own over time. Alert your doctor if it persists for several more menstrual cycles or becomes painful.

Breast cysts can have a number of symptoms, including: **Lumps:** A breast cyst can feel like a smooth, soft, round or oval lump that moves easily within the breast tissue. Some cysts are so small that they can't be felt. A cyst located near the skin's surface may feel like a blister.

Pain or tenderness: Breast pain or tenderness may be felt in the area of the lump, especially before a menstrual period.

Nipple discharge: Nipple discharge may be clear, straw-colored, yellow or dark brown.

Breast self-exam, or regularly examining your breasts on your own, can be an important way to find breast cancer early, when it's more likely to be treated successfully. Although no single test can detect all breast cancers early, many people report that performing a breast self-exam in combination with other screening methods can increase the odds of early detection.

Ask The Weatherman

How warm and wet was the summer of 2024? It was the 5th warmest summer on record at the Sarasota-Bradenton Airport with an average temperature of 83.7 degrees, 0.9 degree above normal. Record warm summers were recorded at Lakeland, Plant City, Punta Gorda, St Petersburg, and Winter Haven. It was the wettest summer on record at the Sarasota-Bradenton Airport with 47.32 inches. Fort Myers also had a record wet summer with 43.87 inches. Parrish had the second wettest summer since we moved here in 2005 with 43.28 inches. Hurricane Debby and easterly flow contributed to the wet summer in 2024. Too much westerly flow in 2023 gave us a dry summer with only 12.60 inches of rain at the airport. Westerly flow was wet for the FL East Coast in 2023 with an all-time record of 113.61 inches at Fort Lauderdale.

Was August another record-setter globally? The August global surface temperature was 2.29 degrees F above the 20th -century average of 60.1 degrees F, making it the warmest August on record. This was the 15th consecutive month of record-high global temperatures. Europe had its warmest August on record. Antarctic sea ice extent was second lowest on record for August. Death Valley National Park had its hottest summer on record with an average temperature of 104.5 degrees. Heat was a contributing factor for two fatalities. A man had to be rescued from sand dunes after losing his flip-flops and experiencing second degree burns. Phoenix AZ set a record with 113 consecutive days of high temperatures reaching at least 100 degrees F.

Who has drought? West Virginia remains historically dry. On 15 Sep, West Virginia led the nation with 98% of its pastures rated very poor to poor, along with topsoil and subsoil moisture rated 100% very short to short, according to USDA. In Ohio, significant drought stress extended to row crops, with U.S.-high 28% of the soybeans rated very poor to poor. In the hardest-hit drought areas of southeast Ohio, other complications included abysmal streamflow and surface water shortages. On 14 Sep, Texas led the country with 36% of its cotton rated very poor to poor. Summer drought forced McGlasson Farms in Hebron KY to use a drip system to hydrate crops.

Who was hit by Francine? Hurricane Francine was a moderately strong tropical cyclone that brought extensive flooding to parts of LA and northeast Mexico. The 6th named storm and 4th hurricane of the season made landfall in southern LA in Terrebonne Parish with sustained winds of 100 mph on 11 Sep. Storm surge was greater than 4 feet. There were mandatory evacuations, water rescues, and loss of power to 450,000 customers. Strong winds and heavy rain moved into MS. Peak rainfall included 7.44 inches in Brownsville TX and 7.90 inches in Matamoros, Mexico. Strong winds and heavy rain moved into MS. Lowest pressure was 972 millibars or 28.70 inches of mercury. There were no deaths, 4 injuries, and \$1.5 billion in damage.

How much rain fell in North Carolina? Historic rainfall occurred across the Cape Fear Region of South-eastern NC on 16 Sep. Gauges and radar estimates showed that 12 to 20 inches of rain fell in only 2 days, creating severe flash flooding affecting Carolina Beach, Southport, Bolivia, and Bolling Spring Lakes. Although this system never became a named tropical system, observed weather impacts including strong winds, heavy rain, and flash flooding were similar to tropical storms and hurricanes of the past. The peak storm total was 20.81 inches at Carolina Beach.
