



Deputy Kaczmarek has over 20 years experience serving 7 years as a detective. While serving as a detective, Deputy Kaczmarek investigated numerous cases that involve fraud, elderly exploration contractor fraud, property crimes and criminal statewide trends. Deputy Kaczmarek holds 2 designations from the Attorney General's office of Florida. Deputy Kaczmarek through his investigations, has seen many cases successfully prosecuted not only in Manatee County but in other jurisdictions. The topics covered will be from his experience in interviews with suspects, who typically commit these crimes against citizens in our area .

Council Meeting Minutes December 18, 2024 - 7pm

Attendees: Pastor Ed Holloway, President Rebecca Powers, Beverly Brockschmidt, Rae Dowling, Mike Gutzler, Mary Hunter, Rich Jones, Patty Kunkel, Rhoda Olson, Stephney Rose, Nancy Taylor, Jeff Taylor

The meeting was called to order at 7pm, with a prayer and devotions by Pastor Ed.

Minutes Approval – Approval of the November minutes was motioned by Rhoda and seconded by Patty. They were approved unanimously.

Pastor's Report – Pastor provided his numbers report which is available in the office, and he also commented on how a few members have commented to him on how our congregation is positive and joyful congregation. Nothing is perfect but all is mostly good!!

Call Committee Report - All paper work has been submitted to the Synod and it is currently under review. We await word from the Synod regarding a candidate for our new Pastor.

Team Reports - All Team reports were submitted electronically and can be reviewed in the office.

The Parish Life Committee has been reorganized to spread the work across more people and improve communication for the many facets of this large committee.

Financial Report - A full financial report is available in the office.

General Funds receipts are less than same time in 2023. All other receipts will be favorable to last year by years end. We've set aside \$30,000 in reserve funds to assist in calling a new pastor. All God's Children budget is \$13,000 favorable to disbursements.

The 2025 church budget was presented and approved unanimously by the council and will be presented to the congregation at the annual meeting on Jan 26, 2025.

The 2025 AGC budget was also presented and approved unanimously.

Building Improvement - Rich and his team continue to make great progress and are working hard to improve the building. Lights in the Sanctuary Hall will be replaced beginning early January. The Sanctuary Hall will also see popcorn ceiling replaced, vinyl plank floors added, and painting completed in early 2025. All paving has been completed. Murals have been hung. More artwork and "life" needs to be added in the Activities Hall. In the 1st quarter of 2025, the Building committee will begin discussion and planning for what and how things might need to be changed, updated or improved in the Sanctuary.

As the Building Improvement Committee has improved the Church building with the restricted funds that we have, they see a need for the entire campus to be improved. As a council we concur and want to see the entire campus taken care of with the same focus and attention.

Discussion ensued regarding the funds that have been received over the last few years. It has been just over two years since the entire campus Forward in Faith campaign came to an end. Recognizing that we still had work to do, with much needed cleanup and remaining work to the property, parking lot and buildings, the Council requested that "Forward in Faith" be changed to "Building Improvement Fund" on our giving envelopes and encouraged continued giving toward this effort. In 2024 alone, over \$178,000 has been given to this account. The Council appointed Vice President Rich Jones to chair a committee to advise the Council as to needed projects and to oversee the appropriate us of this fund. Rich and the committee have done an outstanding job.

The Council believes the words "building improvement" are misleading. Just like Forward in Faith, the fund is for the entire campus community, grounds, parking lot, buildings, signage, drainage, etc. As a result, giving envelopes starting in April will say Campus Improvement Fund.

As always, individual gifts for restricted and designated purposes will be accepted under the current guidelines with no change.

New Business—The Annual Meeting will be held on January 26th immediately following the 11am service. Our next Council meeting will be January 15, 2024 - 7pm at LLLC.

The meeting was adjourned with the Lord's Prayer.

FROM YOUR FAITH COMMUNITY NURSES

It's February – American Heart Month – a time when the nation spotlights heart disease, the Number 1 killer of Americans.

President Lyndon B. Johnson, among the millions of people in the country who'd had heart attacks, issued the first proclamation in 1964. Since then, U.S. presidents have annually declared February American Heart Month.

Throughout the month, the American Heart Association's "Heart to Heart: Why Losing One Woman Is Too Many" campaign will raise awareness about how 1 in 3 women are diagnosed with heart disease annually.

The first Friday of American Heart Month, Feb. 5, is also National Wear Red Day as part of the AHA's Go Red for Women initiative. Coast to coast, landmarks, news anchors and neighborhoods go red to raise awareness and support for the fight against heart disease. For more information on the event and other activities during the month, visit **GoRedForWomen.org**.

This year, the federally designated event is even more important due to the impact of the coronavirus on the public's heart health, including potential harmful effects on the heart and vascular system, according to recent research.

Also, during the COVID-19 pandemic, many people have delayed or avoided going to hospitals for heart attacks and strokes – netting poorer outcomes and prompting the AHA to create "Don't Die of Doubt," a national awareness campaign that reminds people that hospitals are the safest place to go when you have symptoms.

And while in lockdown, more people have engaged in unhealthy lifestyle behaviors, such as eating poorly, drinking more alcohol and limiting physical activity, that can contribute to heart disease.

Meanwhile, heart disease continues to be the greatest health threat to Americans and is still the leading cause of death worldwide, according to the AHA's Heart Disease and Stroke Statistics – 2021 Update.

The update, published in the association's flagship journal Circulation, reports that nearly 18.6 million people across the globe died of cardiovascular disease in 2019, the latest year for which worldwide statistics are calculated. That's a 17.1% increase over the past decade. And 523.2 million cases of cardiovascular disease were reported in 2019, a 26.6% increase over 2010.

During American Heart Month, the AHA and other organizations reinforce the importance of heart health, the need for more research and efforts to ensure that millions of people live longer and healthier.

In most cases, heart disease is preventable when people adopt a healthy lifestyle, which includes not smoking, maintaining a healthy weight, controlling blood sugar and cholesterol, treating high blood pressure, getting at least 150 minutes of moderate-intensity physical activity a week and getting regular checkups.

Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it. Proverbs 4:23
